Winter Externship Spotlight

This winter break I began working as an intern at ImmSchools, a non-profit organization dedicated to supporting immigrant families and their children in the K-12 education system. As an intern, I worked on the logistics of distributing financial aid to families, community outreach, and event planning. One of the main events that I helped organize this winter was a drive-through Toy drive. Through the Toy drive, ImmSchools was able to bring joy and assistance to 100 immigrant families in my hometown of Dallas, Texas. My experience at ImmSchools has been wonderful because I have been able to work on projects that give back to my community and benefit many immigrant families like my own.

This past winter break I did a remote externship with Project Hospitality, a private non-profit organization based in Staten Island, NY that provides comprehensive services for hungry, homeless, and inadequately housed people, especially those who are living with multiple diagnoses such as HIV, substance abuse, and/or mental illness. As a data analysis and consumer satisfaction/trends extern, I analyzed data and trends from satisfaction surveys to inform the planning and evaluation department. A lot of my time was devoted to organizing raw data (agency-wide and departmental), performing calculations, and



creating accessible visualizations in Excel that would enable the implementation of quality improvement initiatives. Most of my project was done independently, but I was able to develop meaningful connections with the wonderful people of Project Hospitality, including Carleton alumnae Carrie Bloss '97 and my amazing supervisors. I am incredibly grateful for my experience with Project Hospitality and the opportunity it gave me to explore my professional values and career interests while contributing my developing expertise to such an impactful organization! I would



encourage everyone to apply for externships as they are a fantastic way to explore your interests in a professional setting, learn something new, gain valuable experience, develop skills, and make connections. As for this externship specifically, I would highly recommend it to anyone interested in data analysis and/or nonprofit work.

TRIO Workshops

For the first-years, in-person and online workshops were organized 3rd and 4th week to discuss the results of the Strong Interest Inventory and how to use these results to plan and continue to explore interests at Carleton and outside of Carleton (externships, internships, volunteering, etc.). TRIO Peer Leaders have also led some fun activities during these workshops to further community building and to relax!

During the "Learn about Credit" workshop, sophomores had the opportunity to test their credit IQ, debunk some common myths, and investigate some common scenarios, that dealing with credit, in small groups. Then, in a larger group discussion setting, experiences were shared as well as how to build and manage credit!

Juniors had the opportunity to hear from alum, Bolu Johnson '18, who works in finance about how to set your-self up for long-term financial stability! Topics that were covered during the workshop included basic investing, the power of compound investing, and more!

Whether you're making \$20k or \$200k out of college, it's important to have and follow a budget. During this workshop, seniors had the chance to draft a personal budget, review sample budgets from recent TRIO alumni, share tips about how to leverage budget needs in the search for jobs, and negotiate salary and benefits!

Social Media Activities

Every Wednesday, you can expect to receive a motivational message on TRIO's Instagram page (@carletontriosss) from TRIO director Trey Williams. Motivational Mondays first began when Trey wanted to give students encouragement to finish the week strong. Working with TRIO intern Shealuck Vang, Motivational Wednesdays became a weekly motivational video message. Trey says:

"I wanted to do something fun to engage with students online, but once I started to read comments and emails from students and staff, I realized this could turn into something beneficial. The goal of Motivational Wednesday is to remind everyone that we all have many things in common, and that none of us have this figured out. We are striving every day to do better than what we did yesterday. Whether you need a pick-me-up, comedy relief, a familiar face to look at, motiva-




tion, I hope to give that to you. I give a ton of credit to Shealuck Vang who helped build this--I wanted to do something fun, but it turned into something more.".

First-Generation Faculty and Staff Panel

On January 29th, TRIO and SAO held the joint First-Generation Faculty and Staff Panel. Carleton staff were invited to participate in this year's panel and audience, inviting more topics and experiences into the conversation. This year's panelists featured professor Deanna Haunsperger from the Math and Statistics Department, Associate Dean of Admissions, PEAR staff member, and Carleton alum Rhemi Abrams-Fuller '08, and Assistant Director of the Gender and Sexuality Center Rae Horton.



The three talked about their backgrounds as first-generation college students, having varying levels of awareness and support for their identities, and what advice they would give to students. Afterwards, there was a short discussion period where students, staff, and faculty went into breakout rooms to talk about how first-generation students at Carleton could be supported and how to expand conversations around socio-economic status and class on campus. Next year, we hope to see more students in person and to continue sharing the stories of staff and faculty in order to create a space for all Carls to bring awareness to first-gen issues!

Fiesta Fridays

This Winter Term Peer Leaders had the opportunity to bring back Fiesta Fridays! These events occurred weekly from Week 2 to Week 8 for First-Year TRIO students. The goal of these events was to create a space for TRIO First-Year students to meet and interact with their fellow peers. Fiesta Fridays were a mix of both virtual and in-person,

socially distanced events which allowed all students to join in the fun! The events included creating vision boards, a brownie study break, a journaling session, a Mid-Term movie night, Valentine's Day crafts, and the baking of mug cakes! Supplies were provided in the mailboxes of students on campus and shipped home to those studying remotely. These events brought together TRIO First-Years for a great time and even better friendships throughout the term!
