1. Overview

- Use "weird speech errors" as an insight into irregular past tense formation
- Predict the irregular forms speakers will accept and produce
- Speakers knew which vowels contained the semantic information of the irregular past


2. The Lexicalist Irregular Past

- The past tense is formed in the lexicon through analogy
- The lexicon generates vowel changes in the irregular past, forms them into words, and analogizes them with similarly structured words

3.Connectionist **Irregular Past**

- Phonological patterns and a system of weighted nodes create the past tense
- A neural network learns the appropriate vowels and generates them based on experience

- The English irregular past is correlated with low/back vowels
- Out of all irregular forms produced, 86% were either back vowels or [æ]

Speakers favored the phonological derivations of the connectionist theory instead of lexical analogy (2) when forming the irregular past

4. Method

- I surveyed 50 English speakers
- Multiple Choice- 4 words, 4 nonce words, select the most grammatical conjugation
- Free Response- 4 words, 4 nonce words, supply the conjugation
- The answers were rated as predicted, plausible, or unlikely

Results/Conclusions

- Back vowels and [æ] resulted in 86% of all generated vowels
- In the multiple choice and the free response, my predicted form was chosen/provided 7/8 times
- These results suggest the phonological derivation of the connectionist model

- Is there an island regularity that contains the semantics of the English irregular past?
- What other languages have a past tense like this?
- Are there other categories that pattern the same way?
