The Board of Trustees at a special meeting on August 28 endorsed the creation of a Community Plan for Inclusion, Diversity, and Equity at Carleton, with a special focus on Black experiences. Trustee Jeninne McGee '85 and Professor Chico Zimmerman recently agreed to co-chair the planning effort, which will include inclusive processes to provide students, faculty, staff, alumni, parents, and friends across the college community the opportunity to add their voices and views. Here are the most recent updates on what the college is doing and how to get involved:

- Sponsored by Carleton's history department, the annual <u>Lefler Lectures</u> feature preeminent


