

Society, Culture, and Language in Peru-Spring 2013

The program will be based in Peru's capital city. A city of 8,000,000, with extensive neighborhoods sprawling outside the traditional and business centers, the Lima area has been the center of key cultural developments in the Americas since 5,000 years before the appearance of the Inca Empire, and later, together with Mexico, the center of Spanish dominion in colonial times. The program will also include two extended stays in the Northern coast (based in Trujillo) and Southern highlands (based in Cusco). Stays in Lima and in those areas (and shorter trips to other sites) will allow students to observe the differing sides and the contradictions and paradoxes of modernization in a "third-world" setting. The program's primary objective is to create conditions for the students to reflect on such reality and the cultural artifacts created by the peoples of Peru.

### BACK FROM PERU-SPRING 2012

As a part of the Peru program, each student was assigned a host family in Lima who we lived with for about eight weeks. These homestays were definitely my favorite aspect of the program both because of the close relationship I developed with my host parents and because of the deeper insight I gained about Limeno culture and values. As a member of a middle-class apartment building, I developed relationships with my neighbors, how to direct any taxi driver to the building, and where to find the best fresh bread within walking distance. Through the program's volunteering component, I was also introduced to another side of Limeno society as I went door to door trying to raise awareness about domestic violence in El Augustino, a densely populated impoverished neighborhood

in Lima. While talking to women outside of their corrugated metal and cinder block homes, I learned something about what their life was like and the strength that they had in order to keep living it. Although I spent time in the upper class areas of Lima as well, I learned the most and enjoyed myself the most in the districts most tourist never see. I doubt I would have seen much more than any other tourist if I hadn't been on this particular study abroad program with Jose.

Having never travelled south of my home state of Texas and having only taken a year and a half of Spanish, the trip to Peru was extremely interesting. At times it was hard, but it was always amazing. In Lima, I had a wonderful host family with a Mama who cooked really delicious Peruvian food. This always consisted of rice, chicken, and potatoes. And then a few more potatoes and some more rice. My favorite experience by far was our time in the magnificent Andes. The mountains were gorgeous; the air was cool and crisp. The sun was warm and

the people were beautiful. Plus, we had the opportunity to wear traditional Peruvian clothes and harvest potatoes with tools that looked like they were from the 1800s. It was truly an amazing experience! I am so thankful for the experiences I had in Peru, and would probably go back if I wasn't an ENTS major who probably needs to finish her requierments.

Because of my experience volunteering in la casita Terrazas in the barrio, El Agustino, Lima, I have decided to apply for an education-based seminar this winter break.
