Learning Outcomes

The Department of Sociology & Anthropology has identified the following six student learning outcomes for majors:

- 1. Articulate the complexity of contemporary socio-cultural phenomenon in their many dimensions (e.g. temporal, structural, spatial and symbolic).
- 2. Formulate appropriate sociological and/or anthropological research questions about socio-cultural phenomena.
- 3. Select appropriate sociological and/or anthropological research methods to study sociocultural phenomena.
- 4. Apply sociological and anthropological theory to analyze socio-cultural phenomena.
- 5. Describe how sociology and anthropology interact with one another and contribute to various interdisciplinary conversations.
- 6. Engage the world by drawing upon your understanding of historical and contemporary socio-cultural phenomena.

Assessment Tools

- Survey for Incoming Majors
- Senior Exit interviews
- Evaluation of each comps for achievement of outcomes 1-4, assigning scores of "insufficient," "novice," "competent," and "expert" (see SOAN Comps Grading Rubric)

Survey for Incoming Majors

Survey questions:

- 1. What drew you to major in SOAN?
- 2. Were there specific classes and/or experiences with the department that helped you decide to major in SOAN?
- 3. What are you most excited about as a new SOAN major?
- 4. Do you have any concerns about the major, moving through the coursework, or comps?
- 5. Other comments welcome.

Senior Exit Interviews

Interview questions:

- 1. Did the SOAN major teach you how to discuss current social and cultural issues? Can you provide some examples of courses in which this learning experience happened?
- 2. Can you give an example of a course in the major where you felt that you learned to formulate appropriate sociological and/or anthropological research questions about socio-cultural phenomena?

- 3. Did the SOAN major teach you how to select an appropriate research method? Can you provide some examples of courses and subjects where this learning experience happened?
- 4. Did the SOAN major teach you how to apply sociological and anthropological theory to analyze social/cultural subjects such as criminality, ethnic identity, or conceptions of the family? Can you provide some examples of courses in which this learning experience happened?
- 5. Can you tell me about a time when you realized how the disciplines of sociology and anthropology are connected? Can you provide some examples of subjects, topics, or contemporary debates where this learning experience happened?
- 6. Can you tell me about a time when the SOAN major showed you how to engage the world? Can you provide some examples of where in the curriculum this learning experience happened?
