Grants Office Changes

Though personnel changes are imminent in the grants office, the good service will remain constant.

Christopher Tassava will step into the CFR Director position effective March 2. Since 2005, he has coordinated faculty proposals garnering nearly 300 grants worth ~\$14.5M; and assisted with institutional grants, effectively managing the Mellon-funded Broadening the Bridge project along with partnering with Mark on

other projects funded by the Mellon Foundation, NSF, ACM, and many others.

Charlotte Whited will be the new Assistant Director, effective March 2. Over 6 years in the office she has helped coordinate nearly 175 institutional proposals and manage ~100 new awards worth a total of \$16 million. She has served on the IRB for 5 years and assumed increasing responsibility related to compliance with state and federal grant regulations.

Heartfelt thanks go to **Mark Gleason** for his 15 years of service as Director of CFR! May his foray on the lake of retirement be full of smooth sailing.

The newest <u>Proposal & Award Policies & Procedures Guide</u> (PAPPG) (NSF 20-1) was released and changes go **into effect** for proposals submitted or due on or after **June 1, 2020**.

Biographical Sketch and Current and Pending Support components will require submission of a PDF generated through the use of an NSF-approved format. Proposers will be able to use <u>SciENcv</u> OR download a fillable PDF from an NSF page (links given below), complete the form, and upload it as part of their proposal via FastLane, Research.gov or Grants.gov.

- Project Description will no longer need to contain a separate section within the narrative labeled "Intellectual Merit"
- Synergistic Activities has been updated to clarify that synergistic activities should be specific and must not include multiple examples to further describe the activity



For NIH

- New NIH "FORMS-F" Grant Application Forms and Instructions Coming for Due Dates on or after May 25, 2020. Applicants must use FORMS-F application packages for due dates on or after May 25, 2020 and must use FORMS-E application packages for due dates on or before May 24, 2020. Look for new forms no later than March 25, 2020, posted to the How to Apply Application Guide page. See High-level Summary of Form Changes in FORMS-F Application Packages for a full list of form changes.
- Data sharing <u>draft policy</u> requires all investigators with NIH funding to make data sets available to colleagues.
- NIH <u>Grants Policy Statement</u> dated October 2019 includes revisions; see <u>Significant Changes</u> es since Oct 2018.

NEH Fellowships: due by Wednesday, 4/8/20 for individuals pursuing advanced humanities research; duration of 6-12 months; maximum grant of \$60,000. Refer to CFR's <u>NEH Proposal Specifics page</u>, and <u>NEH Fellowships</u> page.

NIH R15 Academic Research Enhancement Award (AREA): due annually 2/25, 6/25, 10/25 for faculty and undergraduate researchers in the biomedical and behavioral sciences at educational institutions that have not been major recipients of NIH support; duration of 3 years; up to \$300,000 in direct costs. For other opportunities, scan all of NIH Funding Opportunities and Notices.



NSF CAREER: due by Monday, 7/27/20 for early-career faculty who desire to pursue leadership in integrating education and research; duration 5 years; minimum grant of \$400,000. See the <u>CAREER solicitation</u> NSF 20-525 and the <u>FAQs</u> page for 2020-25. Additionally the <u>Find Funding</u> page enables searching for opportunities by research area, title, upcoming due dates, special programs.

Faculty grants awarded since October 2019



Gao Hong

<u>2020 Artist Initiative grant</u> in Music from the Minnesota State Arts Board (MSAB). Gao will write the first double concerto for pipa (Chinese lute) and bassoon with symphony orchestra that will be performed by Hong on pipa, Ye Yu on bassoon, and the Kenwood Symphony Orchestra conducted by Yuri Ivan.
