Alvarez, Walter, 1997, *T.rex and the Crater of Doom*: Princeton, N.J., Princeton University Press, 185 pages. Written by Carleton's most famous geologist (After Larry Gould) this is the story of the development of the asteroid hypothesis for the extinction of dinosaurs at the end of the Cretaceous Period.

Rea, Tom, 2001, *Bone Wars: The Excavation and Celebrity of Andrew Carnegie's Dinosaur*: Pittsburgh, Pa., The University of Pittsburgh Press, 276 p. This is the story of Andrew Carnegie's passion for dinosaurs and the collection of *Diplodocus carnegii* from near Sheep Creek, Albany County, Wyoming.

Cadbury, Deborah, 2000, *Terrible Lizard: The First Dinosaur Hunters and the Birth of a New Science*: New York, New York, Henry Holt and Company, 374 p. If you like 19th Century British intrigue this is the book for you. It starts with a 12-year-old girl who was the first to discover what subsequently became known as a dinosaur. Cadbury vividly describes the struggles among scientists to be the first and garner all the acclaim.

Lambert, David, 2000, *Dorling Kinderley [DK] Guide to Dinosaurs*: New York, New York, DK Publishing, Inc., 64 p. This is a wonderfully illustrated guide. It is one of my favorite books; it is recommended for ages 8-12 but works for children as young as 3 and as old as I am.
